A wonderful thing happened at two churches in Grand Ledge on October 8 and 9. Fifty + people from Movimiento Cosecha (The Harvest Movement) Grand Rapids arrived at Immanuel Lutheran to share in the community dinner. They were on a pilgrimage that started on Friday, October 5th, walking from Grand Rapids on their way to rally at the Lansing Capitol. They arrived hot, tired and hungry. The chatter around tables as they ate a delicious meal was happy and animated.

Group leaders soon left Immanuel to meet me at our church for a building tour. Everyone would be sleeping on floors and couches that night. Art supplies and a clothesline were set up at the back of our parking lot so posters and signs could be painted then dried for the walk to the Capitol the next day. Another crew unloaded their huge truck full of sleeping gear. After eating, the walking group arrived to choose their sleeping spot and get organized for the night. The night before they had all slept in one big room in a church so they were grateful to have the privacy that our many smaller rooms offered.

Cosecha's media person set up his gear in the sanctuary to film several of the walking group as they told their story about how not having a driver's license affected their lives. Group leaders huddled over laptops in the fellowship hall into the wee hours working out last minute details for the next/last day.

Tuesday morning – Sarah came after work Monday to spend the night at the church with me. Our alarms went off early! Coffee was ready at 6:00am and breakfast at 6:45. Again it was 50 + hungry people, excited to start their last day's pilgrimage.

"It takes a village" is one of my favorite themes, and our church became a village heavily invested in the success of this event. A huge thank you to;

- Our friends at Immanuel Lutheran for preparing dinner and helping with breakfast.
- FCUCC families for supporting this event with prayers, making food, giving \$\$ for food, shuttling people to their homes for hot showers, helping set-up/clean-up,
- To the Endowment Committee who approved using Local Missions funds to help pay for the community dinner.
- To Tony who reserved a hugely discounted hotel room for additional showers and a more comfortable bed for a mom and her daughter who couldn't sleep another night on floors.
- To Jeannette for making the welcome signs out by the road and inside...and for coming early on Tuesday to take photos.
- To Pastor Barb who also came early on Tuesday to welcome Cosecha and offer a blessing before they set out for the Capitol...she spoke one sentence at a time so a Latino mom could translate into Spanish.

FCUCC is blessed to have this amazing opportunity to give an extravagant welcome to Michigan's Latino community. We pray for Cosecha's success as they continue working for Michigan to join 12 other states and Washington DC who give driver's licenses to all who pass the test regardless of immigration status.


SPECIAL OFFERING FOR HURRICANE RELIEF

UPDATE ON MICHIGAN CONFERENCE MEETING

I was the only member of our church to attend the Michigan Conference meeting Oct. 12-13. In the UCC, churches covenant together locally to form Associations; Associations come together in Conferences; and all the Conferences together meet as our national body, General Synod. This year, we were the recipients of hospitality by First Congregational of Charlotte. We had a thought-provoking speaker/preacher, Dr. Alice Hunt (former president of Chicago Theological Seminary), who addressed privilege in its many forms, focusing on creating a healthier society than the patriarchal form of masculinity. Our worship included the Olivet Gospel Choir, and at other times we were led in song by the dynamic and talented Marque Smith. There were so many intriguing workshops, I had a hard time selecting the ones to attend; in the end, I spent one hour in deeper conversation with Dr. Hunt, addressing implicit biases, and went to another workshop on caring for oneself while working for justice.

Besides approving the Conference budget for the next year, the main items of business were a resolution and a set of amendments to the UCC constitution. The resolution, titled "Prudential Resolution: A Commitment to Gender Equity and Equality" passed with an amendment. The amended resolution commits the Conference to creating a Gender Safety program to work in conjunction with clergy boundary training and fitness reviews; supporting several rights; awareness of the added burdens faced by women of color, transgender women, etc.; providing educational and worship resources and doing justice work; and sharing all of this with the wider church. The amended resolution does not seem to be online as I'm writing this, but the original version is in the meeting handbook, which is available on the Conference website (michucc.org).

The amendments to the constitution address three areas: national leadership, relationship with the United Church of Canada, and updating language (such as changing from the older language of "Student in Care" to "Member in Discernment" to refer to those exploring a call to ordained ministry). We voted to ratify the set of amendments; they will go into effect if and when two-thirds of Conferences do the same. If I remember correctly, about two dozen Conferences voted before we did, and about three-quarters are voting to ratify. Many of us are excited about the new relationship with the United Church of Canada, which will be the same as with the Christian Church—Disciples of Christ; we recognize credentials of each other's ministers and can collaborate on broader ministries, but we are not merging or combining the business/finance end of things. The part of the amendments that generated the most discussion was the changes to the national leadership structure. Instead of having three Executive Ministers to work with our General Minister & President (one designated for Local Church Ministries, one for Wider Church Ministries, and one for Justice and Witness Ministries), there will be Associate General Ministers elected by General Synod (our national gathering). The idea is to allow for greater integration and flexibility across the three ministry areas.

Some other bits and pieces to explore further:

Covenant Association Meeting: Nov. 10 in Jackson-see flyer in the fellowship hall

Next year's Conference Meeting Oct. 11-12 in Kalamazoo. Starsky Wilson will be our speaker/preacher. I heard him preach when we were at Eden Theological Seminary—we're in for a strong sermon! In 2014, the Rev. Wilson was appointed by the Missouri governor to lead the Ferguson Commission, and he is the president and CEO of the Deaconess Foundation.



WHAT'S COOKING?

CREAM OF POTATO SOUP

- 3 potatoes
- 4 C. milk
- 2 slices of onion
- 3 T. butter or margarine
- 2 T. flour
- $1 \frac{1}{2}$ tsp. salt
- 1/4 tsp. celery salt
- 1/8 tsp. pepper
- Cayenne pepper to taste
- 1 T. chopped parsley

Cook potatoes until very soft. Scald milk, drain potatoes then add milk to them. Rub through strainer. Melt butter and stir flour into it. Then add the hot milk mixture, seasonings. Stirring constantly, cook 5 minutes. Add chopped parsley and serve hot.


Note: This was our Gramma Zoe's recipe that helped get us through the recession in the 1970's. We still love it! You could use a food processor or blender if you don't want to rub the potatoes/milk mixture through a strainer.

CHEESY HAM N' CORN CHOWDER

- 1 T. butter
- 1/2 C. coarsely chopped onion
- 2 T. flour
- 1/2 C. chopped green pepper
- 1 (14 oz.) can chicken broth
- 4 new red potatoes, each cut into 6 wedges
- 1/2 tsp. crushed dried sage leaves
- 1/4 tsp. pepper
- 8 oz. deli ham, cubed, or leftover from a ham dinner
- 1 1/2 C. milk
- 1 (10 oz.) pkg. frozen corn
- 8 oz. cheddar cheese, shredded





Melt butter in a large saucepan; stir in onion. Cook over medium heat, stirring occasionally, until tender (3 or 4 minutes). Stir in flour and add chicken broth, stirring until smooth. Add green pepper, potatoes, sage, and pepper. Cover and cook until potatoes are tender (approximately 15 or 20 minutes). Add remaining ingredients and cook until heated through (8to 10 minutes). Makes 6 (1 cup) servings.

Call to Order

Moderator Rich Brown called the meeting to order at 6:35 PM.

Board Members present: Tony Bray, Lynn Hart, Fay Schroeder, Anita Calcagno, Kim Dible Glasser, Rich Brown, Bil Turner, Chris Cypher, Karen Holcomb-Merrill and Bruce Ramthun. Also present: Charlene Avery.

Spiritual Reflection

Bruce offered a prayer about the high energy evident in the congregation and led the group in the Lord's Prayer.

Open Forum

No one was present for this item.

Consent Agenda

The Treasurer's Report was pulled from the Consent Agenda. The Consent Agenda minus the Treasurers Report was accepted.

Treasurer's Report

Fay commented on some items in her report. Pulling the Mission line items from future budgets was discussed. We were reminded to begin the work of the Stewardship Committee. Moved by Bil, seconded by Bruce to approve the Treasurers Report. Motion passed.

Discussion Items

<u>*Water leak.*</u> Miles Plumbing has submitted a bid to repair the leak in the kitchen water line for \$2716.50. Gary and Kathy Burt have very generously offered to pay the cost of this repair. Karen moved and Bruce supported the motion to accept the offer from the Burt's and to move ahead with the repair. Motion passed.

<u>Chimney repair</u>. Kim has had difficulty contacting either firm that submitted bids on the work. Discussion followed. It was concluded that she would contact the firm who submitted a bid for the more complete work, and if they would honor their previous price, we would go ahead with the work.

<u>Fire proof cabinet.</u> The existing cabinet is full of historical paper work, and if we care to store any more we will need another cabinet. Rich will ask Jeannette to find quotes for an added cabinet. Fay will look into digitizing the historical items that we currently have stored.

EXECUTIVE BOARD MINUTES (continued)

<u>Parking lot depression</u>. The snow plow fellow has noticed that the depression is getting more pronounced and expressed concern for his equipment this winter. Rich will initiate a meeting between the plower and the maintenance group to discuss options.

<u>Immigrant walk event</u>. Charlene explained that a group from Grand Rapids, Movimiento Cosecha, will be carrying out a walk from Grand Rapids to the Capitol in Lansing. The walk is to support "Driver Licenses for All". An individual from East Congregational Church – UCC from Grand Rapids has contacted our church to request help in providing overnight accommodations for this group of walkers on the night of October 8th. They expect 50 to 75 walkers. They have also requested an evening snack and breakfast in the morning. Immanuel Lutheran Church has indicated willingness to take half the group. After discussion, moved by Tony, seconded by Bruce to act as a host for this group, in cooperation with Immanuel Lutheran. Motion passed. Board of Outreach will coordinate the effort.

Search Committee Update

Karen reported that our Profile has now advertised by the Conference office and responses have begun to come in. On Monday of this week the Search Committee met with Rev. Lovett who briefed the Committee on useful methods for reviewing incoming Profiles of applicants. He said we should expect to receive many applications. The Search Committee will review the Profiles of applicants as they come in and meet to discuss them.

New Business

Chris advised the Board about problems with the method of counting the offering while she was away, and handed out copies of a worksheet for the correct method.

Anita informed the Board that the Personnel group has received four applications for Nursery caregiver, based on an advertisement placed on Facebook.

Meeting adjourned at 7:35 PM

The next Executive Board Meeting will be October 23rd at 6:30 PM.
