The Endowment Fund of First Congregational United Church of Christ was established to create a gift that continues to support programs which are beyond the capabilities of our annual budget.







EXECUTIVE BOARD MINUTES (continued)

November 27, 2018

Call to Order

Moderator Rich Brown called the meeting to order at 6:35 PM.

Board Members present: Fay Schroeder, Rich Brown, Kim Dible Glasser, Tony Bray, Bil Turner, Julie Wilkinson and Chris Cypher. Also present Sue Sackett and Frieda Schneeberger.

Spiritual Reflection

Rich led the group in the Lord's Prayer

Open Forum

Sue informed the Trustees the square dance group would like to expand from two Friday evenings a month to four. There may be occasions when cleaning up by our staff will not work out, however, this group has usually been diligent about leaving the room as they found it. The Executive Board agreed to this expansion on a trial basis.

Sue has had a problem finding the standard brass cleaner she has been using for the alter pieces, and also wonders about refinishing these brass items. She will get a price for refinishing, report back and will also check with Darlene about what is used on the bells.

Consent Agenda

The Treasurer's Report was pulled from the Consent Agenda. The Consent Agenda minus the Treasurers Report was accepted.

Treasurer's Report

After discussion, moved by Bil, seconded by Tony to approve the Treasurers Report. Motion passed.

Action and Discussion Items

Marjory Haueter Endowment Fund. Frieda informed the Board about a gift to the church from the estate of Marge Haueter. Frieda discussed the gift with the family and learned that it was Marge's wish that the gift be used to ensure that the church remains open and viable. The Endowment Committee has drafted language for the creation of the Marjory Haueter Endowment Fund, and the draft was presented to the Board. The two features of this Fund are that the interest may be used to support some line items within the Building & Grounds category, and that occasionally small amounts of principal may be used to support Facilities Maintenance. After discussion, moved by Julie, seconded by Fay to approve the language and to create the Marjory Haueter Endowment Fund. Motion passed.

<u>2019 Church Budget</u>. The 2019 budget as proposed by the Finance committee was passed out and briefly discussed. The budget will be an agenda item at the December Executive Board meeting.

<u>Pastoral Care Update.</u> Kim has agreed to be the point person for Pastoral Care within Congregational Life.

EXECUTIVE BOARD MINUTES

Personnel Committee review with Pastor Barb. No one was present to provide an update.

Chimney Repair Update. Kim has heard back from Mark Stambaugh with an updated repair estimate. The present price is a \$400 increase from last spring, the new amount being \$6230. There is money available in a restricted fund for Building and Property Improvements. Moved by Bil, seconded by Tony to go forward with the repairs. Motion passed.

Stewardship Committee Update. Julie asked the Board to set dates for the key events in January. The Budget meeting will be January 13th and the Annual meeting will be January 27th.

December Executive Board meeting. After discussion the meeting was moved to December 18th.

Water Bills. Bil reviewed our water usage history with the City. Our usage was quite steady at 1000 to 1500 gallons per month for many years. Then in January of this year it increased dramatically and began to fluctuate significantly each month. It seems likely our leakage problem began then. After the recent repairs, we will need to watch our bills to see if they return to normal. He also learned that the fixed portion of our monthly charge for water is based on our meter size, and that we might be able to reduce that charge by changing to a smaller meter. There would be a one-time cost for changing the meter. The Board felt further detail should be pursued.

New Lock Box for the Office. Chris explained that the newly purchased lock box does not meet the needs for temporary storage of church funds. The opening is too small and the storage capacity of the box does not seem adequate. She also stated that she will be away for three weeks and will need someone to stand in as Financial Secretary.

Search Committee Update

The Committee will meet on December 3rd to continue the review of candidates.

New Business

No new business

Meeting adjourned at 8:15 PM

The next Executive Board Meeting will be December 18th at 6:30 PM.

NEWS FROM THE FALL COVENANT ASSOCIATION

'Tis the season... for meetings! First Congregational UCC in Jackson hosted the Covenant Association on Nov. 10. In the United Church of Christ, congregations covenant together into Associations; the Covenant Association has just over 40 congregations. Associations (six, in our case) covenant together to form Conferences; I wrote about the Michigan Conference annual meeting last month. The thirty-eight Conferences meet together every two years at General Synod (in Wisconsin next year!). If you're curious about the wider church, an Association meeting is a great place to start - it's generally the smallest, shortest, and cheapest type of meeting!



We heard reports from previous recipients of Justice & Witness grants. Lansing Church of the Brethren reported on two projects. Plant Justice, Grow Peace is a program in collaboration with St. Stephens UCC. They meet monthly in Lansing to work on systemic issues; one focus right now is to raise the age of juvenile court jurisdiction in MI to 18, so that not all 17-year-old defendants are automatically tried as adults. The other project is Loads of Love, which provides free loads of laundry, books, and snacks once a month at All Washed Up; the number of people served has varied from 7 to 34. Bethel UCC in Manchester reported on a vespers program, which offers worship and a free comfort food meal once a month, serving about 85 people.

After approving the Association budget, we discussed and approved a proposal to free up an additional \$15,000 to fund Justice & Witness grants with a focus on systemic change. The deadline was Nov. 30, but it may continue into future years, so keep this in mind if you have an idea for a project!

There were several announcements. EHM is dedicating a new rehab facility. You can read a short (300 words - about half the length of this article!) blurb each month about a person from UCC history; find it under UCC Roots on the Conference website (michucc.org) or sign up to get it by e-mail. Central Seminary in Ann Arbor offers various courses; some are meant for future ministers, and some are more of a stand-alone class for regular church folk.

The keynote speaker, Traci Bartell, spoke on congregational singing and led us in trying some songs. She spoke about the physiological and spiritual effects of singing and how it can build community. She also shared some questions to ponder when selecting songs to use in worship, and she provided a list of resources (both songbooks and information about singing).

I was able to attend two workshops. The first was on protecting the environment. I shared some of what we've done to recycle, to improve our lighting efficiency, and to dig out invasive plant species along the creek. Members of other churches shared their activities, such as installing solar panels (which also provides income), eliminating foam cups, composting food scraps, and using lower-impact products from fair-trade coffee to environmentally-friendly pizza boxes (sourced from BGreen in Ann Arbor). The second workshop I attended was on churches in transition; these included pastoral transitions like ours, but also new forms of ministry, selling church buildings, and new uses within a church building. Most of this one was aimed at pastors, with a focus on leadership and communication.

The spring meeting for Covenant Association will be at Bethlehem UCC in Ann Arbor; date is to be determined, but probably in April or May. Hope to see you there!



Jean Sheren's Peanut Butter Sheet Cake



1 c. water

4T. Peanut butter

2 sticks butter or margarine

2 c. flour

2 c. sugar


1 tsp. baking soda

1tsp. Vanilla

2 eggs

1/2 c. buttermilk

Frosting:

1 stick butter or margarine

4 T. peanut butter

6 T. milk

1 tsp. vanilla

1 1/2 boxes powdered sugar

Heat together in pan on stove butter or margarine, peanut butter, milk, vanilla and powdered sugar. Spread over warm cake

Fool Proof Pie Crust

4 c. flour

1 T. sugar

2 tsp. salt

1 3/4 c. shortening

1/2 c. water

1 T. white vinegar

1 large egg

Stir together the flour, sugar, and salt. Cut shortening into the flour mixture. It should make pieces the size of peas. In another bowl, beat water, vinegar, and egg. Add the liquid to the flour and stir just till moist. Form into five portions and refrigerate for 30 minutes. Roll out and place in pie plates or tins. You may bake immediately or freeze raw with or without fruit filling (also raw) for up to a year. Tolerates much handling and maintains a good texture. A healthier version can be made with whole grain flour, Splenda (1 1/2 t.), Salt Sense, and Canola oil (1c.). This crust will be a brown color, but tastes great!!
