Dear Ones,





GUATEMALA MISSION

Hola,

Thank you for all your prayers and support. Our mission trip had "Manos de Jesus" (Hands of Jesus) all over it!

Here is a brief overview of our mission week. We hope to do a PowerPoint presentation on an upcoming Sunday. Details will be in the announcements.

We had a very busy week, it started with Sunday church service at Monte Flor (Flower Mountain), where we stayed. Over the week we built four new homes, installed four water filtration systems, installed two wood burning stoves, gave away solar Bibles in the native language of Quiche', food baskets, backpacks for the children (filled with school supplies and toys). We gave away 50 pair of shoes to the local children so that they could attend school (this is done every Tuesday). We visited 3 feeding programs, which are similar to our 'Vacation Bible Schools'. After spending time singing and dancing with the children we helped serve their meals. Most of the children would only take a bite or two, then would scrap the rest of the food into plastic bags. There are two reasons why they do this; one is to take the food home to share with their families and the second is because the children have traveled a long distance by foot and need to get home before dark.

We revisited the families that we had served earlier in the week and we washed their feet and gave them new shoes. This was a very touching and heartfelt time during our mission trip, both for the families and for our team.

Many lives were touched during our short week. My husband, Doug, and I feel very blessed and proud to have led such a great group to Chichicastenango, Guatemala. We look forward to our next mission trip.

DOING OUR OWN WORK: AN ANTI-RACISM SEMINAR FOR WHITE PEOPLE

At this time in our nation, we are witnessing an alarming resurgence of white supremacy and state sanctioned violence. Now, as always, it is imperative that white people do the deep work required to claim and embody an anti-racist identity, understand the privilege they carry, develop relationships of accountability to people of color, and interrupt racism where they live, work, study, and volunteer.

Doing Our Own Work is a six-day anti-racism seminar (held over three months' time) for white people who seek to deepen their knowledge and capacity to confront racism. Doing Our Own Work helps white people move through places where they often get stuck, so that they can step up with humility, courage, and consistency to participate in movements led by people of color and help move other white people to greater anti-racist awareness and action.

EXECUTIVE BOARD MINUTES August 27, 2019

Call to Order

Moderator Rich Brown called the meeting to order at 6:30 p.m.

Board Members present: Charlene Avery, Fay Schroeder, Pastor Laura, Lynn Hart, Kim Dible-Glasser, Anita Calcagno, Bruce Ramthun, Karen Holcomb-Merrill, Rich Brown, Julie Wilkinson, and Bil Turner.

Spiritual Reflection

Pastor Laura led the group in a prayer.

Open Forum

No one was present for this item.

Consent Agenda

The Consent Agenda was accepted.

Action and Discussion Items

<u>Pastor's Report</u> Pastor Laura reported that she has spent a significant amount of the month becoming acquainted with the staff, the Boards and Committees, and planning, writing and performing worship services. She has also performed a funeral, is preparing for a wedding, and has attended a meeting of the Grand Ledge Ministerial Group. She is planning on attended a Boundary Training Workshop in September.

<u>Pastor Parrish Committee</u> Karen reported that the Committee had met with Pastor Laura and plans to meet regularly. The Committee includes Karen, Marsha Kent, Charlene Avery, Tamara Lipsey and Leah Horn. She also reported that Pastor Laura's installation ceremony will most likely be held in March.

<u>Water usage update</u> Bil explained that the water usage for the last several months seems about right, but he would like to continue to observe the billing for a little longer.

Regarding the monthly flat rate charges for the meter, we are now paying \$100/month for a 2" meter. We could reduce the meter to ³/₄" and pay \$12.45/month or a 1" meter and pay \$31.13/month. After discussions with Miles Plumbing and the city, a 1" meter seems to be the wisest choice. The bid from Miles plumbing to change to a ³/₄" meter is \$788, and the estimate to change to a 1" meter is \$870. Moved by Fay, seconded by Anita to change to a 1" meter. The motion passed. Executive Board Endowment funds may be available to fund this work. Bil will act on this item.

 $\underline{Stewardship\ drive.}$ A general discussion was held on starting the Stewardship Campaign. The Committee will begin meeting in September. Stewardship Sunday will be the 2^{nd} Sunday in November. The Finance Committee should also be on alert.

<u>Parking lot update</u> There is no change in status of this project.

Board of Education Report.

- Rally Sunday will be September 15th. Following worship there will be a potluck meal and a "Let your Light Shine" party. Sunday School will start the following Sunday at 9:30 AM.
- Sign up has started for 5 minute Light reflections by members, and for Sunday School teachers and helpers throughout the year.
- Adult Sunday School offerings for the Fall will include a seminar on giving a Light Reflection on September 22nd and a 6 week book discussion on "Eviction" beginning on September 29th. This will be followed by a 4 week Advent Conspiracy series. Details to follow.
- Christian Ed will be supporting Trunk or Treat.

<u>Maintenance projects</u>. There is a broken window in the west entry way. There are mortar cracks in the north wall of the new addition that should be sealed.
