God of new life, of joy, of resurrection hope; hear our prayers today.

We long to be resurrection people, to embody the presence of the Risen Christ, to spread the good news among the world.

But we confess that we look backward. We are comfortable to listen to the accounts of the first Easter and rest in the history and tradition we know. We adopt our familiar patterns of celebration—the music and scriptures and flowers and foods—that evoke memories of our past.

We pray today for those we hold dear. Our children and parents; neighbors, and friends. Hear the prayers of our hearts, the ones too precious and personal to speak out loud.

We pray today for the people of this world; those whom we do not know; the ones who need a new horizon of hope. The ones who are hungry, jobless, homeless, afraid, alone, mourning and dying.

Hear our prayers on behalf of all those who lead us in these days. Our pastors. Our government officials. Teachers and administrators. Parents. May they be hopeful in their vision, compassionate in their leadership, transformed in love.

Let the news of the resurrection propel us into our future as God's people. Facing into the history that lies ahead of us, joining generations of faithful people looking ahead with hope and assurance; God's presence our strength.

We pray these things in the name of Jesus Christ who brings new life, new awakening, and new possibilities in power and love. And join our voices in the Lord's Prayer from the New Zealand Book of Prayer:
