

FROM THE PASTOR'S KEYBOARD

Dear Ones,

In this past month, we have finished our Lenten journey together, celebrating with Jesus as he entered Jerusalem, dining with him as he shared with us the Last Supper, wept with him as he was crucified, and then rejoiced with him as he was resurrected. In the week since then, our church has celebrated a wedding and graduates from our exploring faith class and, this coming week, we will celebrate a Baptism and hold Communion. In this past week, we also held a funeral for our beloved Jim Johnson and I heard from several people in the congregation that they also lost beloved ones in just this past week. Throughout all of these life-changing events and celebrations of sacraments, a song has been playing in my head, "In the Bulb, there is a Flower." Perhaps I'm hearing it because it is spring and I am seeing so many of our bulbs bloom. But the choir also chose to sing it for the young men who completed our exploring faith class, so perhaps that is why it has been on my mind. I suspect, though, that it is its message that really has put this song in my head. It is often called, "the song of hope," because it suggests that there are new beginnings just waiting to happen in every new seed—a wonderful song for Baptism, for a wedding, and for graduates of a faith class. But it also reminds us, as does the Lenten journey and our Easter celebrations, that in death there is resurrection, in what seems like an end, a new beginning. It is a song of hope, indeed, especially as we miss those who have died. So I share the words of it here that we may all meditate upon the hope of new beginnings.

Jackson Lipsey Statement of Faith April 24, 2022

I learned a lot during my time in the faith class, and I've begun to understand what God and Christianity mean to me. God is to me a moral compass, or a map in a sense; guiding me on my journey through life and exploring spirituality. I see God's goodness through the actions of good people in an out of church. God speaks to me by giving me a sense of what is morally right and wrong. Jesus is like a teacher to me, leading by example, loving and caring for all. For me, to be a Christian is to follow in his footsteps and spread his love and kindness to others. This church has a done a great job in teaching me his lessons, and providing a loving community for me to explore my beliefs. I appreciate this community's support as I continue to learn about other's beliefs while solidifying my own.

Jacob Proctor Statement of Faith April 24, 2022

Who or what is God to you? Is God a person, force, spirit? Is he near or far away from you? To me, God is a person, but also a force, and a spirit. I believe God is always there. He is the creator, the guide, the answerer. God helps us in times we need, like these times were in right now.

Have you prayed to God to guide you through this pandemic? I have for sure. Outside of prayers though, do you see God? Does he comfort you when you are fearful? Does he appear when you worship and praise? Do you feel His presence when making decisions? How do you actually see God showing up in the world? Where have you encountered him? I have encountered God and I have seen his miracles. He shows up and guides me with schoolwork. He blesses me with a good night's sleep. He helps me with baseball and helps me make a good play. He always makes sure I have family and friends whenever I need them. God helps all of us. He blesses me. He blesses you. He blesses all of us. He has blessed the people not here today. God has blessed everyone. He loves us like children because we are all God's children. God helps people in desperate times of need and He answers prayers, God is everywhere.

We have all chosen to believe in God and that is why we are all here today. That is why we are placed at the table in God's dining room. But not everybody believes in God. Why? That is their choice. Nobody is forced to be a Christian. But what does it mean to be a Christian? A Christian is somebody who has put faith into God. Somebody that is willing to believe in Him, love Him. and worship Him. There's not just one way, and one way only to be a Christian. As part of our Exploring Faith class, I was able to visit a Greek Orthodox church in Lansing. It was a great experience. Everybody was so welcoming. The way that they taught and worshiped was a lot different than I have experienced. But, everybody in that room was a Christian, just differently. I am a Christian. I believe in God, I took this faith class to explore more about my faith, and I have a bible next to my bed every night. But I haven't gone to an actual church service in a long time. I haven't worshiped God as a group in a while. But that doesn't mean I'm not a Christian. I believe He is there when most needed and guides. I believe He is the creator.

This exploring faith class has really opened my eyes to a whole lot more than before. I know some things now that I didn't even know existed. But one thing that specifically shaped my experience was realizing how strong my Faith in God is. I have been a Christian for years but this class helped me grow my relationship with God. I'm proud to have taken this class with such amazing people. All these people of God. Thank you to my teachers Karen, Demphna, and Pastor Laura. Thank you to our mentors Charlene and Ron. I would also like to thank Tamara and Jackson for asking me to be a part of this great experience. Thank you.

Call to Order

Moderator Leah Horn called the meeting to order at 6:32 p.m.

The meeting was held over Zoom due to Covid-19 distancing recommendations. Two members attended by phone.

Spiritual Reflection

In the absence of Pastor Laura, Leah began with prayer.

Open Forum

No one was present for this item.

Consent Agenda

Due to illness, there was no Pastor's Report. The remaining items were accepted.

Action and Discussion Items

Stewardship Campaign

Totals remain the same as reported at the Annual Meeting.

Update to Covid-19 Prevention Program

There was a lengthy discussion to consider updating our policy of mask requirements. It was determined that it is extremely difficult to keep up with writing new policies due to the rapidly changing guidelines from the CDC and the State of Michigan. Motion made by Fay Schroeder and seconded by Charlene Avery to adapt the recommended guidelines from the CDC as changes occur. Motion carried.

Return to Congregational singing during worship

After discussing the possibility of the return to congregational singing during worship, it was decided that there would be no action taken at this time. We may revisit this in March.

Wedding Questions

In response to the wedding questions posed in an e-mail by Pastor Laura, it was the opinion of the Board that

wearing masks or not during the ceremony should be the decision left up to the Pastor. Also, with input from the Tech Team, who are not videographers, since the cameras are stationary mounted, it may not be possible to provide acceptable coverage of the proceedings to meet the participants approval. Therefore, it is recommended that the church not provide video recordings.

EXECUTIVE BOARD MINUTES (CONT.)

Personnel Question

Linda Gooley asked for clarification of the job responsibilities for the position of Christian Educator, currently being filled by Demphna Krikorian, in order to prepare a job description. Linda referred to a rough job description, a copy of which she had provided to the Board prior to tonight's meeting. Based on information discussed, Linda will prepare the job description to be entered into the Personnel files.

New Business

The Board of Congregational Life asked to return to the use of bread and cups to serve for Communion service. The Board agreed. Congregational Life also asked if an 8:30 a.m.

Easter sunrise breakfast should be offered this year. The consensus of the Board, because of Covid issues, was tending not to offer food at this time, but is willing to revisit it next month.

In Pastor Laura's absence, Jim Robinson was asked by someone for a gas card. On behalf of our church, Jim purchased a card for this person and will turn in his bill for reimbursement. Leah will follow up with Pastor Laura to see if there is a procedure in place for gifting the gas cards.

Leah just learned that Darlene Banks may actually have fallen in the church parking lot several weeks ago. Leah will talk to Darlene to obtain more information and update the Board when she learns more.

Next meeting will be March 22, 2022, at 6:30 p.m., manner TBD. Meeting adjourned at 7:41 p.m.



Lillian Daniel is a nationally recognized preacher, teacher, and writer who cares deeply about clergy and congregations. After serving four unique congregations in the UCC, she now feels called by the Holy Spirit to leadership as the next Conference Minister of Michigan.

A graduate of Yale Divinity School, she began her ministry as an Associate Pastor at a large church in Cheshire, Connecticut. From there she became a Solo Pastor at a small urban church in New Haven, Connecticut where the choir outnumbered the congregation, but over eight years, they grew to become a vibrant, interracial community that also became Open and Affirming. This would be the first of three churches to go through the Open and Affirming Process under her pastoral leadership; which also includes extensive experience organizing for justice in politically diverse settings, serving on boards of Interfaith Worker Justice and the Community Renewal Society. After ten years as a Senior Pastor at a large church in the western suburbs of Chicago, Lillian moved to the beautiful drift less region of Dubuque, Iowa where she has been Senior Pastor at an historic urban church since 2016.

Rev. Daniel will begin her ministry as our Conference Minister on July 1, 2022. Please join us in welcoming Rev. Dr. Lillian Daniel to Michigan and keeping her in prayer during this time of transition.
